

A mum of two who pawned her belongings to feed her kids has mopped up an amazing £20 million in door-to-door sales.

Hard-up Lynn MacDonald was so poor, her children had to sleep on the floor.

But thanks to her amazing sales patter, she has gone from rags to riches in just four years.

Divorced Lynn has pocketed nearly £250,000 in earnings and is set to move into a £200,000 home.

Last night, she beamed: "I can earn more than cabinet ministers and still have time to do the housework"

Divorcee Lynn, 36, hit hard times when a business flopped and she found herself struggling in a one bedroomed flat with Leigh, 12, and 10 year old Linzi. They had no money, mounting debts and the larder was bare.

Then she started selling cleaning products around doors in her street - and never looked back. In four years Lynn and her business partner, Bob Park have clocked up £20 million in sales as Kleeneze distributors.

Lynn said, "I've seen hard times and good times

and I can honestly say I prefer the good times."

"I have shared access to my children and when they were with me I was so broke they had to bed down in sleeping bags on the floor. I had to pawn my jewellery and telly to get money to eat."

"But now things are different. I have always dreamed of owning a huge house and that is going to happen."

"And I've been able to replace my old Sierra, which had to be started with a screwdriver after an attempted break-in, with a new convertible Ford Escort."

Lynn, who lives in Falkirk, Stirlingshire, is confident she'll DOUBLE her earnings next year.

She said: "Last month the business achieved a record £750,000 in sales. And it's now our aim to reach £1 million a month."

"Someone told me that I am now in the top 5% of earners in the UK which is just amazing."

"I miss absolutely nothing about being skint, but I think I'm still the same person."

"I'm still a housewife - and a mum and still do all my own housework."

"But I sometimes have to pinch myself to believe what has happened to me simply by putting catalogues round the doors."
